Mental Health Research Fellowship

How it works:

- Funding for 1 day a week for 18-months to a maximum of £18,750 (via backfill)
- Carrying out a 12-month project under supervision with an ARC senior researcher
- Attend teaching workshops & action learning sets
- 6-months working on an implementation project with the Eastern Academic Health Science Network

Main aims:

- Making sense of the research world
- Promoting the use of research-based evidence in healthcare and mental health organisations
- Turning research into practice with a 6 month implementation project

Who is the fellowship aimed at:

This fellowship is for mental health practitioners and people who impact mental health more broadly. This includes clinicians, NHS managers, health and social care practitioners and those who work in education or third-sector settings. Applicants must also be based in the East of England.

The Mental health fellowship is aimed at people who are keen to develop an understanding of the research environment, and to develop skills in research methodology, service redesign and change management. The focus is on local applied research and evaluation projects, building local capacity for evidence-informed practice, and facilitating networking across health and social care.

Discuss with Theme Lead, Kristy Sanderson, if the project is **suitable** for a fellowship

Identify a supervisor and write proposal ready for applying (support is available for this)

If shortlisted, **attend an interview** 3 Feb 2023

Mental Health over a Life Course

The successful applicants will be part of the ARC EoE's Mental Health over a life course theme. Lead by Professor Kristy Sanderson, this theme includes researchers from world class universities (University of Essex, University of Cambridge, University of Hertfordshire and University of East Anglia).

Addressing a wide a range of areas that impact mental health in the UK, researchers are working towards achieving key aims, such as:

- building a research infrastructure to fill the damaging gap between physical and mental health services;
- working to improve identification of children's and young people's emotional and wellbeing problems through to adulthood, and
- exploring better ways to support the mental health and wellbeing of health and social care staff
